PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT JUNE 1ST 2006

My first year as president of RHCS has proved to be a very busy one for our board and supporters. We started off the Spring with another season of guided tree walks plus planning meetings for Treefest.

Some of the highlights of 2005/06 include:

- Our first Children's Tree Walk
- Participated in the gARTen Tour, hosting artists outdoors at Finnies Garden
- Hosted Burke Mountain Naturalists' (BMN) June meeting a nature walk with Don Gillespie and refreshments after at Finnies
- The official launch of Cottonwood Lodge
- · Linden walk and tea under the Linden trees
- Participated in the Como Lake Festival a very wet tree walk with Mary Brown
- Announcement that BCBC would be folded into the Ministry of Labour and Citizens Services and would be known in future (Apr. 1/06) as Shared Services B.C. Stewardship committee meetings have continued as usual.
- Stream enhancement project at Riverview Creek funded by BCBC
- Treefest display at Coquitlam Farmers Market and Poirier Library
- Treefest 2005 including themed tree walks, heritage buildings tour, children's walk
- Began a visioning process with BCBC and BMN to produce a document that will form the framework for the care and management of the present tree collection and the development of guidelines for future tree plantings. Part of this process includes the re-tagging and updating of the tree inventory.
- At our Feb. 06 meeting we heard a presentation by Ian Birtwell and Nick Davies (BCBC) and Marilyn Marchment (big think communications) which gave an overview of the status quo at Riverview

We continue to work through the Stewardship Committee with Shared Services BC and BMN to achieve the best possible outcome for the future of the wonderful tree collection and urban green space that is the Riverview Hospital site.

The Strategic Planning Committee

Since January, 2006, I have represented RHCS on the Coquitlam Strategic Planning Committee of the Whole. This rather long title describes a city committee formed to gather input from community groups and involved citizens for revising Coquitlam's Strategic Plan, last visited in 2003. The committee has met four times under the leadership of Jennifer Wilkie, with another meeting scheduled for June 8. The revised 2006 Strategic Plan will be drafted over the summer and we will have a chance to review it and give feedback prior to publication.

The meetings are held at Coquitlam city hall and consist of a presentation followed by group discussion where opinions are recorded. We have also been given a large volume of background material to peruse. Livability issues such as crime, transportation, development, parks, youth, environment, and heritage have all been debated. The approximately 50 participants are mainly individuals who have served on city advisory committees and represent a broad spectrum of interests and opinion. City staff members and some council members also take part.

The role of the Riverview Lands in the future of Coquitlam arose (or was brought up by yours truly!) many times during these discussions and the Riverview Task Force report was made available to participants. I was pleased to observe a much enhanced level of

public awareness of the Riverview site and it's potential. The hard work of our members who mount displays, organize and attend tours, write articles and letters, sit on committees and just talk about Riverview is definitely paying off.

However, there are still those who have not visited the grounds and are unaware of their unique features. I recommend that RHCS continue to search for ways to expand our support base by offering more varied activities on site that appeal to a wide range of interests and age groups.

Because of my involvement in this project, I attended a lecture in Richmond where New York urban geographer Fred Kent, president of Project for Public Spaces (www.pps.org) outlined his concept of a livable city. He emphasized that opportunity for meaningful activity is an essential factor in the success of any public space. I could envision how a unique landscape like Riverview could play an important role in such a livable city and it made me realize that we should be more open to considering a wider variety of uses for the buildings and landscapes.

I look forward to my continued involvement in this civic project and I will continue to push our vision and represent RHCS in this arena.

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From the Walk Director

As usual we have had a busy year of talking the talk through our wonderful mature open-grown trees. The season seems to get earlier each year, and we end up chasing the last few flowers (magnolia, linden) as they have flowered earlier than usual. Anyway we have seldom had poor weather, but do notice that the threat of rain puts people off coming, although we have never cancelled because of weather. One bonus has been several arborists (or people training to be) on the walks, who are interested in helping us with Treefest, and other events.

Besides the walks I have been delighted to join the Natural Heritage Stewardship group at a time when the discussion has moved along from care-taking the existing collection to inviting several arborists to join us to discuss our vision for the future of the Lands. We have also been helping to identify trees for re-tagging all numbers, and designate which trees will receive informative signs (originally 100, but now we are being asked to suggest up to 500). With Latin and common names, place of origin, and tag number, not to mention the digital positioning system in progress, this is going to make the trees much easier to identify. Such things as planning for succession planting are ahead.

We are planning a new way of doing the self guided tour, with separate sheets for each zone, starting with the zones currently on the SG list, and adding more as time allows. We hope that this will give people a chance to explore more areas of the collection.

I would like to thank the Arborists who have volunteered their time to lead our walks so faithfully, and the members of Burke Mountain Naturalists who have brought people to the Lands and contributed enormously to the Treefest planning and Stewardship groups.

The Rosa nutkana that Pam gave us are in bloom on the bank along with Mahonia aquifolium, Holodiscus discolor, Lupinus, and of course Dame's rocket. This show is our reward for the many, many months of whacking back the blackberry bushes! I know now I must invest in a digital camera so that I can capture these spectacular images to share with others. We spotted an Aquilegia Formosa in full bloom near the 'woodland garden' and Mary spent some time weeding an area to give Arctostaphylos uva-ursi a better chance.

I hope that everyone will visit Finnies soon. It is really beyond description, and you must experience it for yourself.



Finnies is maturing and becoming more visitor friendly not only for us humans but because of increased diversity for other creatures as well.
